TRUE OF FALSE C C T I V I T Y

This is a great activity that gets students' thinking! I suggest doing this activity as a motivator before learning about ways to care for the Earth!

I used this activity as part of an observation lesson last year, which is why it is broken down word-for-word!

TRUE OF FALSE CICTINITION TRUE OF FALSE OF THE OF

Let's Get Moving! - Quickly introduce students to true/false terms using posters. Display PowerPoint of true/false situations. Tell students to move to the "true" side of the classroom (where the "true" poster is displayed) if they think the statement on the screen/poster is real or actual. Tell students to move to the "false" side of the classroom (where the "false" poster is displayed) if they think the statement on the screen is unreal or fake.

Read the following true/false statements on the screen to the class:

Teacher: True or False: With the garbage we produce in America, we could form a line of filled-up garbage trucks and reach the moon.

Anticipated Response: Students will move to the "false" side of the classroom. Explain that this fact is actually TRUE. Display the visual on the screen. Teacher will say, "Can you believe it? That is a lot of trash!"

Teacher: True or False: We use about 20 trees worth of paper in our lifetime.

Anticipated Response: Students will move to the "true" side of the classroom. Explain that this statement is FALSE. Say, "The average American will use 465 trees for paper in their lifetime! Wow, sounds like a whole forest! If we recycled that paper, all those trees wouldn't need to be cut down!"

Teacher: True or False: Plastic is the only thing we can recycle.

Anticipated Response: Students will move to the "false" side of the classroom. Explain that this statement is FALSE. Teacher will say, "We can recycle a lot of different materials. Can anyone name one?" Students respond with, "paper," "glass," "metal," "clothes," (Answers will vary depending on the students' background knowledge.) Teacher will say, "Excellent thinking! You all did a great job playing our true/false game. Now, let's come on down to the carpet to take a closer look at ways we can care for the Earth."

Teacher: True or False: We use about 20 trees worth of paper in our lifetime.

Anticipated Response: Students will move to the "true" side of the classroom. Explain that this statement is FALSE. Say, "The average American will use 465 trees for paper in their lifetime! Wow, sounds like a whole forest! If we recycled that paper, all those trees wouldn't need to be cut down!"

Teacher: True or False: Americans use enough plastic cups, forks, and spoons in one year to circle the Earth 300 times.

Anticipated Response: Students will move to the "false" side of the classroom. Explain that this fact is actually TRUE. Display the visual on the screen. Teacher will say, "How sad! This problem could be solved if people chose to use silverware instead of plastic!"

Teacher: True or False: Every year, Americans waste enough food to fill an entire football stadium.

Anticipated Response: Students will move to the "false" side of the classroom (thinking that a lot less is wasted). Explain that this statement is FALSE. Say, "Not every YEAR, but every DAY Americans waste enough food to fill an entire football stadium. It's important to take only the amount of food you plan on eating."

"It all changed when I learned about three very special R's. Reduce, Reuse and Recycle. They're really not that hard.


The first R is REDUCE, which means to use less and not waste.

After that, the little girl and the Litter Monster became dear friends. They'll follow the three R's until the very, very end!







The following activities can be completed after reading all about The Litter Monster and the 3 R's. ENJOY!



Meet Neil




Neil refills his water bottle when it's empty instead of throwing it away.

This craft is the perfect way to celebrate Earth Day. Have your students write about a promise they'd like to make to the Earth on the banner or have them write what they would do if they had the whole world in their hands. This craft makes a cute bulletin board!

Materials:


- Earth Day templates (supplied)

Directions:


This is a pretty straight-forward art project. I like to prepare most of the materials for my students, but it is up to you. You can either have them color their own pieces or you can print each piece on any color of construction paper/cardstock.. Your students can personalize them however they'd like. See examples above.

I highly recommend using glue sticks, rather than glue bottles.


Note: The writing activity gets glued on top of the Earth, and the hands get glued on top of the writing activity.




print on cardstock or have your students color. then, glue continents on dotted lines.












print on cardstock or have your students color in the hands hands get glued on top of writing activity (banner)




print on cardstock or have your students color in the legs legs get glued to back of earth




